Brief background: In 1990 we ioined the HCJB Radio mission in Ecuador. We took over the Czech and Slovak shortwave broadcasting. Its founder in 1975 was Jiřina Kladenská/Gonzáles, who had been born in Ecuador. Her mother Lili Kladensky born in 1925), then known as Mrs. Fialová, helped her to communicate with the listeners. As a young girl, whose father was Jewish, Lili survived a concentration camp. In 2016, at the request of family and friends, she wrote her life testimony in Spanish. Her daughter translated it into English and because we know each other very well and still keep in touch, we translated it from English into Czech. In Ecuador a film adaptation of this story was started, but, due to lack of funding and other events, this project is frozen.
